FREDERICK INNOVATIVE TECHNOLOGY CENTER INC

Before FITCI was created in Frederick MD, many companies, agencies, and partners were working to create a business climate of partnerships that would eventually support a successful technology business incubator. In the early years of this century, Frederick County, like the rest of MD, enjoyed a growing economy – especially in the biotech and information technology industries. The Frederick County Economic and Workforce Development Department and the City of Frederick Department of Economic Development were strong partners focusing on these growing industries. They were also partners with the Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development (DBED), MD Technology Development Inc. (TEDCO), and the MD Technology Network, who were also focusing on attracting and growing technology companies.

About the same time, a group of business leaders under the leadership of Mark Hoke, formed a non-profit – The Fort Detrick Alliance. The Alliance fostered networking among businesses that contracted with federal agencies and military located on Fort Detrick. Enthusiasm for technology companies was growing, and Frederick Technology Business Network became a chapter of the MD Technology Network. Meanwhile, Fort Detrick organizations were also growing and hoping for an infusion of funds with BRAC in a few years. With the help of DBED, TEDCO launched a few technology incubators in MD. The DBED also had strong leadership for military technology from its Director of Military Affairs, General Michael Hayes.

Then one day, Paula Jagemann came through the County Economic Development door and told the receptionist she had to meet Marie Keegin – the Director of Economic and Workforce Development for Frederick County. Paula was one of the original employees of UUNET, and had become a serial entrepreneur in her own right. On that fateful day, Marie and Paula met for quite a while as Paula told the story about another new technology start-up she was launching and wanted to open the company in her beloved Frederick! She was quite concerned the venture capitalists that were interested in financing her new company would only fund her new start-up if she located it in northern VA where there was greater support for technology start-up companies. Paula didn't want that to happen to another start-up in Frederick again. And so began a serious discussion about a technology incubator.

Jim Brady, the Business Development Advisory Council Chair (BDAC) and former Secretary of DBED, loved the idea. The BDAC voted to support it, and helped garner support from the County, City, State and local business partners. Ed Goley, the General Manager of Medlmmune (and was also on the BDAC), Richard Griffin from the City Economic Development, Paula, and Marie began gathering information and locations on the incubators in MD. Soon they found the 3rd floor in the Rosenstock Building at Hood was not being used at the time. The County, City, Hood, BDAC, DBED, Fort Derick, TEDCO, and Paula began talking and gathering concept support. The rest is a story of energy, enthusiasm and endurance.

Hood, the City of Frederick, and BDAC worked with Frederick County to develop the proposal and received TEDCO/DBED start-up funds. About that time, Ed Goley retired from MedImmune and worked tirelessly on developing the specifications for biolabs, overseeing needed construction at Hood, and helping to set up the FITCI non-profit corporation. Paula was the first President of the FITCI Board of Directors which included Shabri Moore, Marie Keegin, Richard Griffin, DBED, Heidi Sheppard from TEDCO, Commissioner Jan Gardner, Patrick Haley, Ed Goley, Beverly Byron, Sherry Challberg, Bob Eaton, Susan Jessee, Dr. Craig Laufer, Eileen Mitchell, Kathleen Shino, Lisa Smith, Chris Foster, and Paul Mele. Mike Daily was hired as the first paid director and the rest, as they say, is history.

FREDERICK - Frederick's Innovative Technology Center Inc. (FITCI) at Hood College is getting international recognition, according to the president of its board of directors.

Paula Jagemann spoke briefly Friday morning to members of the Chamber of Commerce of Frederick County on advancements made at the business incubator designed to give fledgling entrepreneurs a chance of success.

Incubator a go in 2005 FREDERICK — Frederick Innovative Technology Center inc. (FITCD), the county's first business and entrepreneurial technology incubator, has closed its first round of finance ing, executed its lease agreement with Hood College and will be ready for business in

The Maryland Technology Development Corp. (TEDCO), Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development (DBED) and Frederick County and city have delivered on their commitment to provide seed funding for the organ-

ization, according to a state-ment from FITCI. TEDCO and DBED provided \$850,000 in grants to support the capital improvements need ed to furnish and renovate FITCI's 10,000 square foot facility at Hood College's Rosen stock Hall, and to purchase the necessary equipment to allow FITCI to service the local entrepreneurial community, partic-

ularly its bioscience clients. "We believe Fort Detrick within Frederick County to be an important driver in Freder. ick County's and Maryland's future economic growth,"

DBED Secretary Aris Melis-saratos, said. "Financing the FITCI project is yet another example of ways we can support local entrepreneurs working with Fort Detrick and the surrounding area."

The Frederick Innovative Technology Center Inc., the county's first

incubator, is in Resonstack Hall at Hood College in this photo from late Soptomber. FTICI is ready to occupy Resenstock and the

construction is complete, said Paula Jagomann, FITCI president.

The remaining \$150,000, provided by local government and government entities, will provide the much-needed operational cash flow to allow FTTCI to open its doors, including the buring of FTTCI's director, Michael Dailey.

FITCI, which received state, local and community support, began renovations to Rosenstock Hall's third floor this summer and is "thrilled to announce that our formal occupancy agreement has been executed with Hood College and that the construction is complete," said Paula Jagemann, FITCI's president. "We have received outstanding support AOL changes style from the state of Maryland
